2013 Hornet's Nest District

Location: Camp Grimes, Mecklenburg Scout Reservation

Date: February 22th, 23th and 24th, 2013 (Fri.-Sun.)

Registration

Deadline: The attached registration form must be used, or one may be picked up at the Scout

Office. The registration form, along with the total fees must be in the Council office no later than February 8, 2013. This is necessary in order to plan the course, food,

equipment, and patches.

Cost: Cost per Scout and Leader is \$15.00. This is a non-refundable advance registration fee.

This cost includes dinner on Saturday night. Any visitors who plan to eat in the mess hall must be registered. **Meal tickets will be issued based on registration**, **no ticket – no**

food.

Age

Requirement: Scouts who are under fourteen as of March 1, 2013 will be eligible to participate in the

competition. Scouts who are fourteen or over and at least Star Rank by March 1, 2013 are eligible to participate as a staff member. (A new scout who is over 14 may participate with advance approval of the planning staff.) Mecklenburg County Council requires all

scouts have a current medical form.

Patrol Size: A patrol may have no more than 8 and no less than 5 members to participate.

Check-in: Plan on arriving after 7:00 PM on Friday, but not too late (no later than 9:00 PM) to be

sure that your campsite is set up and you are well prepared for the next day's event. Check-in is by the Patrol Leader at the designated Check-In location (look for signs). The staff at check-in will collect your patrol roster at that time. The city you will camp in for the weekend will be determined by Klondike Chief. All patrols will pack to their city from the Activity field. Gear may be transported to the campsites by suitable vehicles. Each patrol should pull their sled to the campsite. The sleds can be taken to the trailhead by the staff if necessary. There must be leadership in the city. If no adult staff is in the city, please wait with your Patrols until staff arrives. Two-deep leadership must be in place in each

city.

Parking: Parking will be in the Main Parking Area. Gear and sleds can be unloaded while the

Patrol Leader and Scoutmaster Check in. One parking pass will be issued to each host troop for parking in the campsite areas. This will be enforced from 6 am to

5:30 pm on Saturday.

Vehicles Vehicles may be used to transport Patrol gear and City/Station equipment to the

campsites on Friday night and out on Sunday morning. Only one vehicle is allowed near the City campsites (no buses). This vehicle should only be used for emergency purposes

during the Klondike Derby.

Sled

Specification: Sleds must be at least 6 feet long and 1-½ feet wide. Your sled must have your patrol name and troop number displayed. There is no weight requirement, but the sled must be sturdy enough to carry your patrol's provisions. Your sled must be made of wood to reflect the history of the Klondike Gold Rush.

You may paint your sled and varnishing the runner bottoms is recommended. Canvas snow/mud guards may be added for the front and top sides. A tow bridle should be made of rope or webbing. The sled runners must be made of wood, in keeping with the tradition of the event.

Competition

Basics:

The trail will pass through Cities and Stations. Every 40 minutes, each patrol will advance to the next City. Cities are worth 20 points and stations are worth 10 points. Remember that the station is optional, and patrols have 40 minutes to complete the tasks at both the city and the station.

Before leaving for the trail in the morning, patrols will be required to fix a hot breakfast for the patrol, which will be judged by the staff in the camp city. This breakfast must be prepared, served, consumed, and cleaned up before patrol leaves for the first city of the day.

Patrols will eat lunch in the city they are in at 1:00 PM. This meal will not be judged, but must be properly cleaned up when finished. Use this time wisely to relax and prepare patrol strategy for the rest of the trail.

Along the trail, patrol will need to use Scout skills to score points. Some of these skills include camping, cooking, first aid, hiking, knots, lashings, compass, teamwork, and most of all Scout Spirit.

Keep patrol sled in good working order. The sled is the key to patrol survival and point accumulation.

Any Scout leader may "escort" the patrol, but this is a discouraged as it may take awary from the competition for the Scouts. Any patrol aided from outside the patrol will of course be disqualified from the city & station. Staff's decision in this matter is clear and final.

Scoring:

The staff in each City will do Scoring. The decision of the staff is final. Each patrol will receive a score for.

- Saturday breakfast judged by the staff in the city patrol camps in.
- Equipment on sled at the beginning of the trail.
- Each city and/or station attempted.
- Equipment on sled at end of trail.

Awards will be given for each city, as well as for overall scoring.

Leadership /

Camp Manners: Two responsible adults must be in each campsite with the patrols at all times. No Scout or Scouter may leave the Camp Grimes without first advising the Klondike

Derby Administrative Staff. Patrol leaders are always responsible for the behavior of their patrol. Problems with adherence to the Scout Oath, Law, or Outdoor Code must be brought to the attention of the Patrol's Scoutmaster or the Camporee Administrative Staff.

Chapel Service: Sunday Morning Worship will be at 9:00 AM at the Chapel Area.

Checkout: No Patrol may leave without their campsite being inspected and approved by the

staff in that city.

Closing Ceremony: Closing is at 10:00 AM on Sunday morning at the Chapel Area. Scouts must be in

Class A Uniform.
